

Options @ 16 - Caring



Caring covers a wide range of careers. These can be grouped as follows:

- Working with children
- Working with people who are ill or recovering from injury
- Working with people who have a physical or learning disability
- Working with people who have emotional or behavioural problems
- Working with the elderly

Here are some examples of jobs that involve caring:

What will the job be like?

This depends very much on the type of caring involved. A carer could work in a day centre, nursery, nursing home, and residential home or visit people in their homes.

Caring can mean working shifts, during the night or at weekends. The work may mean helping clients to use the toilet, wash or eat. It can also involve doing laundry, housework and shopping.

Most jobs within the care sector are looking for people with qualifications.

Skills checklist:

- A friendly, caring nature to build relationships with the patients and colleagues.
- A willingness to work unsociable hours.

- Ability to follow health and safety procedures.
- Ability to listen to patients and their families, reassure them and explain things clearly.
- Ability to treat each patient as an individual.
- Emotional strength to deal with distressing situations.
- Number skills, eg, taking blood pressure readings.
- Patience and tolerance to cope with demanding situations.
- Physical fitness (in most caring jobs, you'll be on your feet a lot).
- Practical skills and the ability to use various types of equipment.
- Tact and sensitivity.

Where are the jobs?

The National Health Service (NHS) claims to be the largest employer in the European Union, but there are also private hospitals that are gradually growing in number. Qualified nurses are in demand.

Local government social services and education departments are responsible for residential homes for the elderly, children and those with mental and physical disabilities. There are also an increasing number of private care organisations that could be considered. Employment opportunities caring for older people are common, but anything to do with childcare is very popular and so highly competitive. Voluntary work in a nursery or crèche is a useful experience. Local authorities, private organisations and a few large employers run these. There is currently a demand for qualified nursery nurses. All applicants for jobs working with children and young people also have to go through a criminal records bureau check.

Local authorities organise probation, social and youth services. They recruit staff on a regular basis. These employees normally hold qualifications and have relevant experience.

How much will I get paid and what are the opportunities?

There will always be a need for carers. This is especially true for those interested in working with the elderly as people live longer and the population ages, although the trend has moved towards providing care in the community or at home rather than in public residential institutions.

There is a national shortage of all types of nurses. In the NHS some nursing staff are employed on short-term contracts or "bank nursing". Private healthcare and the vacancies in this sector are on the increase.

Examples of annual salaries are shown below:

Ambulance Technician

NHS employees are paid on a rising scale within defined pay bands, according to their skills and responsibilities. Ambulance technicians earn around £17,000 a year, rising to around £20,200 with experience.

Most employment is with the NHS, working for one of the ambulance services. Other opportunities are in private ambulance services, working for private healthcare companies.

Care Assistant

Pay rates for care assistants vary depending on employer and duties. Care assistants earn in the range of £12,500 - £15,500, rising to around £16,000.

Care assistants work in the National Health Service (NHS), both in hospitals and in the community. Other employers are private health care providers, including nursing homes. Some care assistants are self-employed and work through an agency.

Home Care Assistant

Home care assistants earn in the range of £12,500 - £15,500 a year, rising to around £16,000. Higher-level home carers can make around £20,000 a year.

Some employers offer flexitime working, and part-time and temporary work is also possible.

Home care assistants work in clients' homes in the community. Employers are local authority social work departments and private care agencies. Some care assistants are self-employed.

Nurse

NHS employees are paid on a rising scale within defined pay bands, according to their skills and responsibilities.

Newly qualified nurses earn around £19,600, rising to around £25,500 with experience. Nurse specialist and those with management responsibilities can earn up to £37,500 a year.

At the highest level, modern matrons can earn up to £43,335 and nurse consultants up to £39,000 - £62,500 depending on responsibilities.

Nurses work a basic 37.5 hour week. Shift work is usual.

Some employers offer flexitime working, overtime is common.

Most nurses work in the NHS (in hospitals and in the community).

Other employers include the armed forces, schools, colleges and universities, private health care providers, the prison service and some private companies.

Nursery Nurse

Salaries for nursery nurses vary depending on whether they work in the private sector or in local authority nurseries. Salaries are in the range of around £11,500 - £20,000.

Nursery managers can earn around £21,000 - £30,000 a year.

Higher rates apply in nurseries with over 15 places. Highest earners are officers-in-charge, in nurseries with over 50 places. They earn around £27,000 - £30,000 a year.

Nursery nurses normally work between 35 and 40 hours a week. Many nurseries open at 9.00 am and close at 3.00 pm. However, the planning and preparation of work mean that nurses start earlier and leave later than the children.

Nurses often benefit from school holidays, and weekend work is not usually involved. There are part-time and job share opportunities.

Nursery nurses work throughout the UK, in nursery, infant or special schools, day nurseries and family centres, hospitals, or crèches.

Paramedic

NHS employees are paid on a rising scale within defined pay bands, according to their skills and responsibilities. Ambulance paramedics earn around £19,600 a year, rising to around £32,000 with experience.

Most employment is with the NHS, working for one of the ambulance services. Other opportunities are in private ambulance services.

Playworker

Pay rates for playworkers vary. Playworkers in local authorities earn in the range of £13,000 - £15,000 a year. In the NHS, salaries are around £17,000 for play specialists, rising to around £20,000 - £25,500 for team leaders and up to £32,000 for team managers. In the private sector, hourly rates for sessional playworkers are around £5.70 - £11.20 per hour, and up to £22.00 for supervisors.

Working hours for playworkers vary. Full-time playworkers work 35-39 hours a week. In the NHS they also work weekends on a rota basis. Other employers require 'out-of-school hours' working. Part-time and temporary jobs are also available.

Local authorities employ around 1,700 playworkers throughout the country to work in play centres, play buses, summer schemes, adventure playgrounds, community projects and after-school clubs.

In the NHS, playworkers are known as hospital play specialists. Children's hospitals have large play departments employing up to 40 hospital play specialists each. In general hospitals small teams of play staff work in different areas of the hospital. There are also opportunities in the private sector, and opportunities to work as a voluntary playworker.

Probation Officer

Probation officers are paid on a rising scale, within pay bands. Trainee probation officers earn around £17,000 a year. Main grade probation officers earn £26,500 - £34,000 a year, and senior probation officers earn around £36,000 a year.

Probation officers usually work 37.5 hours per week. You may need to work some evenings, nights and weekends, usually on a rota.

Probation officers work in prisons, courts, hostels and day centres throughout the country. The Probation Service currently employs around 21,000 frontline and support staff.

Social Worker

Social workers earn in the range of £18,000 - £21,000, rising to £26,500 - £30,500. Higher earners (team leader and management roles) can make around £35,000 - £41,000 a year.

Local authorities employ most social workers in the social work section of their social services departments. Field social workers are often part of specialist teams, for example, specialising in child protection, elderly people, mental health problems or carers in the community.

Local authorities employ most medical social workers in hospitals, although they can also be found in health care centres, general practices and outpatient or special clinics.

Some voluntary and charitable organisations also employ social workers (in paid positions), supporting and enabling the most disadvantaged groups in the community. Large organisations like the National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children (NSPCC) and Barnardos employ qualified social workers.

Youth & Community Worker

Pay rates for youth workers vary depending on the duties of the post.

Youth workers earn in the range of £15,500 - £19,000 a year, rising to £22,000 - £26,000. Higher earners can make around £29,000 a year.

Full-time youth workers typically work around 40 hours, Monday to Friday. You may have some early starts or late finishes, and you may work on a rota basis with other team members to cover nights and weekends.

Local authority children and young people departments are the main employers of youth workers. Other employers include voluntary and charitable organisations. Youth workers often work on short-term projects, so many posts are temporary - often lasting six months to two years; part-time posts are also often available.

Apprenticeships/National Vocational Qualifications/Work based Learning.

Few opportunities exist to train in this locally. Some organisations recruit young people over 17 into apprenticeships for care with the elderly, but the majority of these opportunities are for the 18+.

Those interested in nursery nursing are advised to go to college for a full-time course as the vast majority of employers require recruits to have already undertaken training.

Apprenticeships/Advanced Apprenticeships – Employer Led

Some employers will employ young people on an apprenticeship programme, however this is a competitive area. Apprenticeships (NVQ Level 2) is the starting point for most young people. Achievement of Level 2 enables progression to Advanced Apprenticeships (Level 3). Apprenticeships are 'Employer Led' and therefore the trainee is employed and will be paid a wage. Apprenticeships last between 2-3 years depending on the person's progress.

Apprenticeships – Programme Led

Sometimes 'Employer Led' apprenticeships are not immediately available therefore it may be possible to start training in an off-the-job setting where the person will undertake job skills and training prior to moving onto employment and an Employer Led Apprenticeship.

Locally there are few opportunities available in this area of work via this route. Competition is fierce and GCSEs in English, mathematics and art are preferred. Both Apprenticeships & Advanced Apprenticeships are available in small numbers. All are either employed or paid a training allowance. There is no NVQ Level 1 available locally in this area of work.

For further information look in the Apprenticeships Handbook, and ask your Personal Adviser for details of vacancies and how to apply.

Full Time Education & Training

Nurse Training

Candidates must be at least 17½ years old before starting training. The minimum educational requirements for nursing are five GCSEs at grade A-C or equivalent qualifications acceptable in the UK. Individual institutions may set their own entry requirements for their programmes which may be above the minimum passes in specific subjects or grades. Applications for nursing must be made through the UCAS applications system. Financial assistance may be available with an NHS Student Bursaries.

Social Work

To train as a professional social worker you will need a degree in Social Work. This is offered at many other institutions throughout the country, including the Lincoln University (Hull Campus) and the University of Hull. Most courses expect applicants to have had relevant practical experience. Financial assistance may be available from the General Social Care Council.

'Advanced Level' Study

For Advanced level study you will need to achieve at least 4 – 5 GCSEs at grades A-C. 'A' levels are available at some schools and colleges and are a route to professional careers in caring and health. Universities may also require specific GCSEs such as English or Maths and certain 'A' level subjects.

For details of recommended subjects and expected grades please check with your Personal Adviser as they vary according to particular jobs.

Vocational Courses

Vocational courses can also be used to go to Higher Education (foundation degrees, HNDs, diplomas & degrees). In the case of Vocational 'A' level, BTEC / Edexcel National Diplomas, it may be desirable to take additional units or an 'A' level.
